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Missouri secretary of state annual report

When a new U.S. president is elected, news reporters buzz about who he will appoint to his cabinet. The highest of these appointments is the US Secretary of State. This person's job is to advise the president on foreign affairs and to lead the U.S. State Department in his diplomatic missions. The Secretary of State is responsible for bringing the president's foreign policy into action, a role that can prove particularly challenging when countries are in conflict. Before we go into the role of a secretary of state, let's first see what the state actually is. According to Merriam-Webster, a state is a group of people within a certain area that has its own independent government. The role of an executive in charge of the state would be to preserve the state itself, to be its keeper of sorts. Ad Although titles and duties vary, each U.S. state or territory has its own office of secretary of state. Most of these officials are in charge of state elections. Some manage state archives and take care of business. Because business regulation includes interstate trade, these officials can also have a diplomatic role, working with other state governments when creating public policy. In this article, we will learn more about the secretary of state's history and the duties that secretaries of state handle at the federal and state level. A political tradition that cut out in the mid-19th century was the elevation of the secretary of state to the office of president. Six 19th-century presidents were previously the country's top diplomat. The secretary of state position was considered such a launching pad to the presidency that men who sought the highest office were widely believed to have been obliquely named secretary of state. The perceived importance of the job is sharpened when you consider that several prominent but unsuccessful presidential candidates of the 19th century had also held the position. But the last president to be secretary of state was James Buchanan, the ineffective president who served for four years in the late 1850s when the country broke up on the issue of slavery. Hillary Clinton's candidacy in the 2016 presidential election was notable in this historic context, as she would have been the first secretary of state to run for president since Buchanan's election 160 years earlier. The office of the Secretary of State is, of course, still a very important cabinet post. So it's interesting that in modern times we haven't seen any secretaries of state become president. In fact, cabinet positions in general are no longer weighing in on the White House. The last president to serve in the Cabinet was Herbert He served as Calvin Coolidge's secretary of commerce when he became the Republican nominee and was elected in 1928. Here are the presidents who served as secretary of state, as well as a number of prominent candidates candidates President who also held the position: The nation's first secretary of state, Jefferson held the position in George Washington's cabinet from 1790 to 1793. Jefferson was already a revered figure for having written the Declaration of Independence and for having served as a diplomat in Paris. So it is conceivable that Jefferson who as secretary of state in the early years of the nation helped establish the position as the most important port in the cabinet. Madison served as secretary of state during Jefferson's two terms in office, from 1801 to 1809. During Jefferson's administration the young nation had its fair share of international problems, including battles with the Barbary Pirates and increasing problems with the British interfering with American shipping on the high seas. Madison declared war on Britain while serving as president, a decision that was highly controversial. The resulting conflict, the War of 1812, was rooted in Madison's time as secretary of state. Monroe was secretary of state in madison's administration from 1811 to 1817. Having served during the War of 1812, Monroe was perhaps wary of further conflicts. And his government was known for making deals, like the Adams-Onis Treaty. Adams was Monroe's secretary of state from 1817 to 1825. It was actually John Adams who deserves credit for one of America's greatest foreign policy statements, the Monroe Doctrine. Although the message of engagement in the hemisphere was delivered in Monroe's annual message (the predecessor of the State of the Union Address), it was Adams who had advocated for it and drafted it. Van Buren was Foreign Minister for two years to Andrew Jackson, from 1829 to 1831. After serving as Foreign Secretary for part of Jackson's first term, Jackson nominated him as the country's ambassador to Britain. His appointment was voted down by the Us Senate after Van Buren had already arrived in England. The senators who thwarted Van Buren as ambassador may have done him a favor because it made him sympathetic to the public and probably helped when he ran for president to Jackson in 1836. Buchanan was secretary of state on the board of James K. Polk from 1845 to 1849. Buchanan served during a government that was fixated on expanding the nation. Unfortunately, the experience did him no good a decade later, when the biggest problem facing the country was the split of the nation over the issue of slavery. Clay was secretary of state for President Martin Van Buren from 1825 to 1829. He became president several times. Webster was secretary of state to William Henry Harrison and John Tyler from 1841 to 1843. He later served as Secretary of State for Millard Fillmore from 1850 to 1852. was Secretary of State to John Tyler for a year, from 1844 to 1845. In this episode, we asked a few of Missouri's more than half a million small business owners about the challenges and opportunities of working in their state. This is what they had to say. Entrepreneurs in Missouri reported an atmosphere of tempered enthusiasm for the future, noting that growth seems inevitable and ongoing, but also that things could be a little better. Business owners face challenges in Missouri, such as a lower-than-average per capita income that continues to decline, and gross domestic product that has grown only modestly over the past 10 years. Still, small business owners in the Show Me State said they believe they are faring better than their counterparts in neighboring Illinois. Entrepreneurs in Missouri cited the low cost of living, ample networking opportunities and a business-friendly environment as a plus of doing business in the state. Even some of the challenges, such as low unemployment that make it harder for entrepreneurs to engage, are indicative of a healthy economy. Business News Daily spoke with business owners in Missouri to discuss some of the opportunities and challenges they have encountered while working in the state. Overall, they told us that Missouri is a pretty good place to do business. [See Business News Daily's] Opportunities Low cost of living Missouri has a remarkably low cost of living, as do many states in the Midwest. Sperling's Best Places cost-of-living index lists Missouri as significantly cheaper than the U.S. average. The U.S. average cost of living is pegged at 100 on the index, and Missouri ranks as a 91.10, according to Sperling's. Particular are the cost of housing, which lists Sperling's as a 78 on the index. Cheap housing and rents mean that workers demand a lower fee, saving entrepreneurs some money on their overheads. For startups and entrepreneurs, I think the low cost of would be a great advantage, said Saeed Darabi, editor of MoneyPantry.com. If you're just starting out and don't have much fund to go through, you don't want to waste tons of money in buying/renting a warehouse or an office. The prices here are much lower compared to other places, especially compared to the Silicon Valley. The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics reports that for the Midwest region, including Missouri, the cost of living is dramatically lower than the U.S. average. The Consumer Price Index (CPI) — a measure of inflation and thus the price level for a fixed partnership of goods and services — stood at 223.196 for the Midwest in February 2016, while the US as a whole had a CPI of 237.111. In fact, from 2014 to 2015, the CPI for the Midwest region actually fell by half a point, while the CPI for the U.S. increased by 0.1. The cost of living in Missouri is helping entrepreneurs right now, says Chris LaRocca, founder of Crushed Red Urban Bake & Chop Shop. We look at the gas prices and it looks great. It has been proven that the lower the gas prices, the more people go out and spend money in their local business. Strong Community Support Entrepreneurs unanimously reported that community support, both in terms of customer loyalty and networking opportunities, is strong in Missouri. Between incentive programs like Arch Grants to accelerators and mentoring organizations, small business owners and startup founders said they had sufficient access to advice, discussions and opportunities to boost their professional network. We moved our company to St. Louis last November after receiving an Arch Grant, said Samantha Rudolph, co-founder and CEO of startup Babyation. The entrepreneurial community in St. Louis is incredible - warm, welcoming and supportive. Thanks to the resources and access, we have made more progress here in the first three weeks than in 18 months on the East Coast. Cooper Mitchell, founder of Dane Financial, said he particularly loves community workspaces and organizations that help bring the state's entrepreneurs together to work together and grow. He mentioned a few notable organizations including the eFactory in Springfield and Exit 11 in the city of Washington. There are more network groups than I ever thought our state could support, Mitchell said. From groups like 1 Million Cups to Masterminds of Biz, there's something for everyone. There is also more and more open/community workplaces... to help entrepreneurs have a place to work and meet other like-minded individuals at low cost. Manageable taxes and regulations In addition to a personal income and property tax, Missouri maintains a corporate tax, sales and use taxes and an employer withholding tax. However, most business owners said that the rates compared to other states in the region. Some small business owners suggested reduced rates or reforms would be desirable, but almost all said they did not stified by state-level regulation and tax policy. Overall, Missouri has a relatively competitive small business climate related to regulation, said Wayne Winegarder, senior fellow in business and economics at the conservative Pacific Research Institute. In the 50-State Small Business Regulation Index, published by the Pacific Research Institute, Missouri was ranked as having the 10th most competitive regulation for small businesses. Challenges Unemployment in the competitive Missouri labor market has fallen steadily and has hovered around 4.2 percent since the beginning of 2016. That may be good news for the state's economy, but it's a tough pill to swallow for small business owners looking to hire. Because there is less talent available in the labour market, strong candidates can be quickly boosted by competition. The labour market is becoming increasingly competitive for great talent, says Susan Gerard, founder of the St. Louis-based Gerard Marketing Group. We see the people who are fully engaged and good at what they do get hired quickly. If you interview someone who's a strong candidate, if you don't act fast, they're not available. Meanwhile, the state's labor force has grown - evidence that more people are working and falling unemployment is not the result of people giving up the job search. From December 2015 to January 2016, the labor force increased by nearly 10,000 people. In February 2016, it increased by another 16,500 people. Still, even as the labor force grows, demand for workers remains high, perpetuating the competitive climate. Our job market is really kind of tough right now, said Jeremy Jacobs, president of Fitness Plus Equipment Services. St. Charles County has the lowest unemployment rate in the state, and it makes finding people who fit well with our corporate culture, as well as skills, difficult. Concentrated Pockets of Wealth Median Household Income in Missouri Varies Significantly from which province you live in. There are more affluent people in the northwestern and central-eastern parts of the state, while moderate wealth spans the northern and and parts of the state between them. Southeast Missouri is less well off than the rest of Missouri, and a cluster of counties in the center of the state is plagued by lower median household income as well. Missouri is divided into two areas: rural and urban. Urban St. Louis and Kansas City - most of the wealth is in urban areas, said Holmes Osborne, owner of the money management firm Osborne Global Investors. There is some wealth in the small towns, but also a lot of poverty. Many people in small towns are retired or in social services. Geographical disparities in wealth can create strategic challenges for entrepreneurs operating in less affluent areas of the state. It also leads to more intense competition in the regions that maintain higher average incomes. Declining per capita income The sporadic pockets of wealth are exacerbated by a problem Missouri has experienced on and off since before the 2008 financial crisis: The average per capita income in Missouri has declined over the past decade. In recent history, per capita income peaked at 92 percent of the national average, according to the U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis (BEA). However, it is now dipped below 90 percent of that average, according to the BEA. The change is reflected in the growth of gross domestic product in the state. While Missouri never saw its economy contract even during the recession, its 2.6 percent compound annual growth rate (CAGR) from 2005 through 2015 ran the nation's already modest CAGR of 2.8 percent. The climate is good, but it could be a hell of a lot better, LaRocca said. Right now, there's not much incentive for entrepreneurs to start their small business in Missouri. The figures emphasize the degree of difficulty. In 2014, the Kauffman Foundation ranked Missouri 18th in the nation for startup activity. By the end of 2015, the state ranking had plummeted to 27th place. Still, Missouri is doing much better in terms of startup activity than all its neighbors.
